Community Engagement at Taunton Flower Show

The Taunton Flower Show, held annually on the first weekend of August, welcomed thousands of visitors this year—and with the warm weather, it was a busy and vibrant event.

We're often asked, "Why do the police attend events like these?" It's a fair question, especially as our resources are stretched more than ever. But the answer lies at the heart of British policing: being visible, approachable, and connected to the communities we serve, and during August we participate in as many of these events we can, whilst other pressures like our ongoing work with schools and colleges drops off due to the summer holidays.

Events like the Flower Show give us a unique opportunity to engage with people of all ages. Whether it's a child's first interaction with a police officer or a curious question from someone who's read a myth online—like the one about being arrested for not paying a TV licence—we're there to listen, inform, and build trust.

Policing isn't just about tackling crime; it's about reducing fear, busting myths, and showing the public the positive work we're doing every day.

At this year's show, our PCSOs and Special Constables (volunteer police officers) staffed a stand filled with crime prevention materials, fingerprinting kits for children, and plenty of friendly conversation. Over the weekend, we engaged with an estimated 10,000–15,000 people—a fantastic turnout and a successful example of community policing in action.




Proactive Patrol Leads to Vehicle Seizures on Bridgwater Road

During a recent patrol, one of our PCSOs observed two vehicles stopped in an unusual position on Bridgwater Road. Upon closer inspection, the officer identified several individuals gathered around the vehicles—many of whom are known to police for previous criminal activity.

Further checks revealed that neither vehicle had valid insurance. With support from our Police Constables, both vehicles were promptly seized under Section 165 of the Road Traffic Act.

This incident highlights the value of proactive patrolling and the continued efforts of our team to keep our roads and communities safe.



POLICE EARLY INTERVENTION TEAM

Lots of us, including children and young people have been worried or upset by recent events in the news. It can be difficult to answer children's questions but its important that children feel listened to and that they are able to talk about the things that they see and to process the feelings they are experiencing. There is a lot of information out there but make sure that you use reliable sources. Recent events have demonstrated how misinformation and untrustworthy sources can cause harm. Encourage your children and young people to speak to you or other trusted adults about the things that they see and help them to understand that not everything they see is the truth. Think before you share online, do you know the information to be true and the source. Use the Share Checklist to help you understand if a story can be trusted.

When anything is reported to Police, we always encourage people to use the crime reference number. If you aren't sure, don't share it

FRAUD AWARENESS

This section on the newsletter will include information on scams that we as the Police are currently aware of and how to hopefully avoid falling victim to these types of crimes.

Parking Penalty Charge Notice Scam

Avon and Somerset Police are warning the public of a phishing text circulating recently which encourages recipients to click on a link to pay a fictitious parking fine. The link leads to a convincing looking fraudulent website which looks like the official government website. You will then be asked to enter your email address, vehicle registration number, and your card details to make a payment, usually of £20.

If you receive a text message like this, do not click on the link, as fraudsters can steal your personal and financial data to commit identity fraud and take your money. Even by clicking the link and not entering any information

Parking Penalty Charge Notice: Please Pay a parking penalty charge notice (PCN) issued by a local council.

If you do not pay a PCN within 28 days, you'll get a 'charge certificate' and you'll have 14 days to pay the original fine plus 50% more.

If you do not pay you'll be prosecuted - you may have to pay a bigger fine as well as court costs.

Please pay your fine at the link after reading the information.

and not entering any information could result in malware being downloaded onto your device.

Phishing messages can be reported by forwarding to 7726, which spells 'SPAM' on your keypad. If you have become a victim of a phishing text scam, report this to your bank immediately, which can be done by calling 159, and report to Action Fraud.

PHOTO OF THE MONTH

At the tail end of August, with the sun still setting after 8pm, **PCSO Supervisor Sharon Baker** was out on patrol making the most of our electric bicycles. These bikes have proven to be a valuable asset, helping officers respond swiftly to incidents such as missing person searches and reports of anti-social behaviour. Electric assistance



makes a real difference when officers are fully kitted out — including body armour, radios, bodyworn cameras, and for our Police Constables, additional equipment like handcuffs, batons, and tasers. The extra weight can make cycling a challenge, but the e-bikes help ensure officers can cover ground quickly and efficiently.

COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH

For those that don't know what 'Community Speedwatch' is, it is where volunteers from the local community carry out speed monitoring checks on specific roads across the community.

The aim of Community SpeedWatch is to make motorists who speed through residential neighbourhoods aware of the impact their actions have on local residents, or the danger they pose to other road users and pedestrians. This is something we are working with communities to address.

The 14 CSW groups in the Taunton area operate in a variety of environments with different speed limits and traffic flows. The urban sites that they operate at have far higher traffic flows with typically 500 to 1400 vehicles per hour whereas the rural sites have approximately 50 to 200 vehicles an hour. However the rural sites have a higher proportion of speeders. Unfortunately the 20mph limits have a higher proportion of speeders whether they are an urban site or rural.

Activity during August

Over the month of August, 4 out of the 14 Community Speedwatch schemes in Taunton have been visibly active across the different communities. From the 15 sessions that took place, 6,641 vehicles have been monitored by our Speedwatch volunteers. From those, a total of 116 letters have been sent out to drivers that have not adhered to the speed limit.

The Community Speedwatch is a great service that greatly assists the Constabulary in reducing speed across the communities. Should you wish to join an existing Speedwatch, or would like to set one up for your area, you can find more information here:

What I would like to reassure you all with regards to these statistics is that certain crime types are grouped together in one category. On our systems we can see far more detailed information, but for what we are allowed to share with the public, crime types are grouped together.

For example one of the categories above is 'Violent Crime'. Domestic incidents fall within that category and Domestic incidents are one of the most common type of incidents we as the Police attend. If you would like to know the definition of what a Domestic relationship is, you can find it here:
